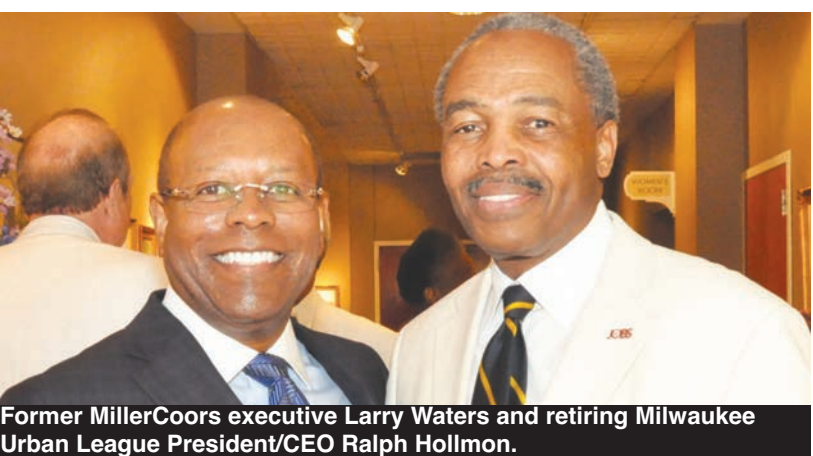

Senate incumbent Taylor defeats challenger Barnes in hotly contested primary race

Jason fields to return to Assembly, Gwen Moore easily defeats challenger Gary George

Incumbent state Sen. Lena Taylor handily won the most hotly anticipated, contested and discussed political race of the year, defeating her challenger, Rep. Mandela Barnes in the August 9 state primary elections.

Taylor collected 61 percent (11,420) of the votes in her fourth district senatorial race.

Despite heavy financial backing and support from the predominately white suburb of Shorewood—and the political action group, Wisconsin Working Family Party, Barnes could only muster 39 percent (7,414) of the votes.

In what could best be described as the second most hotly contested political race in the community, incumbent Milwaukee County District Attorney John Chisholm defeated Atty. Verona Swanigan. Chisholm received 51,469 votes (65 percent) to Swanigan's 27,570 votes (35 percent).

Described by local WNOV radio talk show host Sherwin Hughes as "a phoenix rising from the ashes," former State Rep. Jason Fields reclaimed his former District 11 Assembly seat, narrowly defeating Darrol Gibson.

Fields collected 2,930 votes (59 percent) to Gibson's 2,062 (41 percent).

If there were ever a proverbial "cake walk," it would be the contest between incumbent U.S. Congresswoman Gwen Moore and former state Senator Gary George.

Figuratively speaking (and expectedly), Moore walked all over George in this primary election, receiving 85 percent of the votes (55,093) to George's poultry15 percent (6,508 votes).

In the other senate race involving our community, Rep. LaTonya Johnson will succeed Nikiya Harris Dodd in senate district six, who stepped down from the position for personal reasons.

Johnson defeated two other challengers for the seat, Thomas Harris and Michael Bonds, the former president of the Milwaukee Public School's Board of Directors.

Johnson collected 9,560 votes (61 percent). The race for second place between Harris and Bonds was tight, with Harris receiving 3,158 votes (20 percent), and Bonds 3,011 (19 percent).

In two other Assembly races in predominately Black districts, incumbent state Rep. Leon Young retained his District 16 seat defeating Edgar Lin, Brandy Bond, and Stephen Jansen.

David Crowley will now represent the 17th Assembly district, defeating two other candidates, Kim Burns—the daughter of the late legendary lawmaker Polly Williams—and Marcus Hart.

Racism: An equal opportunity mental disease

They say the greatest trick the devil ever pulled off was to convince people he didn’t exist.

Maybe right behind that ploy was our belief that all liberals are progressive—interpreted everyplace but Wisconsin to mean racially tolerant, open minded and humane.

I used to think that as well.

White liberals marched beside us during the civil rights campaigns.

They were the Democrats who fought for legislation that bettered our peculiar predicament, knocked down the walls of apartheid, and weakened the “concrete” ceiling (glass for White women).

Little did we know that many of them (what percentage is anybody’s guess) were closet racists, or at the very least were being patronizing.

It was a hidden, and often excused dichotomy—that our socially conscience White friends, and our perceived allies—viewed us as being intellectually and genetically inferior, immoral and pathological.

That might sound like a mouthful, and it is. But sadly it’s true for many liberals. And it didn’t start yesterday.

I woke to that reality a long time ago. In case you’re still in the cloud of denial, consider:

* I had always viewed the suburbs as a haven for liberalism. But that theory was raped of any reality years ago when I attended a hearing at UWM years ago to seek testimony about a legislative proposal to create cluster districts that would merge some Milwaukee Public Schools with Shorewood, Glendale and Fox Point schools.

I was standing at the back of the meeting room as “liberal” after “liberal” not only blasted the proposal, but uttered racist epithet after epithet describing how the plan would lead to crime, lower standards and general anarchy.

One woman said “integration” would open the door for interracial dating, which I assume was a “sin.”

I left the meeting not only enraged, but on the verge of tears realizing that their smiles had hid underlying prejudices and hatred for us.

There were several suburbanites who supported the plan and a couple who lambasted the racist comments. But they were outnumbered by the majority, which included women and a couple of Jews (I assume based on dress and name).

Jews, as in the founders of the NAACP? Et tu Brute?

Scan ahead three decades.

* Several months ago a national study revealed that the University of Wisconsin, long considered the state’s most liberal institution of higher learning, was a hotbed of racism.

If there were any doubts as to the validity of that charge, the chancellor has ordered several mandatory diversity programs to medicate the cancer of racism on the campus.

It’s anybody’s guess if those programs will be effective. It takes decades of indoctrination to become a racist. A two-hour program can hardly be expected to exorcise those demons from adult aged students.

* Among the thousands of hacked e-mails from the Democratic National Committee last month, it was revealed that many from high-ranking party officials were racist, sexist and anti-Semitic, and homophobic as well.

Not surprisingly, not one Black Democrat denounced them, or declared them-

selves an independent based on the revelations.

* A Black student at an exclusive private school in the suburbs was shocked when one of his White classmates blurted out that all Black teens were thugs and young Black girls immoral and breeding rabbits (having multiple babies by different men that they are incapable of raising).

When the Black student asked if he was included in that analogy, she thought for a moment before saying no, he was one of the few “good ones.”

The young girl, who comes from a prominent “liberal” family, said her parents were going to vote for Donald Trump because he was going to “fix America,” return it to a better time. I don’t know what “time” that is, but images of Selma and Rodney King come to mind.

I make a distinction (since there is one) between racism and prejudice. And for that matter, my definitions make a distinction between racism and bigotry—the latter being the manifestation or application of racism.

While not all racists are bigots (you have to have power to be one, as you’ll find out if Donald Trump becomes president), everyone I have ever met holds some prejudices, and some are understandable.

To assume all Black people have rhythm is a stereotype-rooted prejudice, as is our belief that Whites don’t have any.

The assumption that all Black teens are gang bangers intent on car jacking, is an extreme prejudice, held by Whites, and Black folks, but often those prejudices are rooted in propaganda, and as such are not necessarily racist.

Most of us believe Asians are smarter (actually, they are more disciplined), Mexican immigrants are harder workers, all Black men have big lips and our women have big, round, butts.

Similarly, not all Republicans are racists, nor are all Democrats “friends.” Only the head of the party can be a bigot, but members of the party can be prejudiced. As are all Republicans, and those of us who do not pay dues to the Democratic party, but vote for them almost exclusively (I’ve voted for third party candidates on a number of occasions).

Confusing? Shouldn’t be.

It’s not easy to determine a person’s heart by merely looking at them, even if you’ve known them for a while. And you can’t assume.

Reciting the lyrics of a gangsta rap song doesn’t mean the reciter is a racist. But a cop, who pulls over a Black driver in a White neighborhood because they are Black, is profiling, which is another form of prejudice.

If a Black cop follows that scenario, is he prejudiced?

I know a woman who has three Black babies by Black men who believes we are immoral, callous and prone to violence. White men are more intelligent, sensitive and moral.

The woman is overweight and unattractive and I’ve always assumed she “settled” for Black men because she held low self-esteem, which does not negate her feelings of White superiority even if she can’t cash in on it. Being of the “majority race”, however, she can benefit from White privilege.

On the flip side, there are many prominent examples in history of supposed “great men” who advanced legislation to bring about equal rights for Black people even as they felt Black people were inferior.

You can start with the drafter of the U.S. Constitution, Thomas Jefferson, who while espousing the equality of all men (but not women), held slaves and wrote that Black people were inferior.

Then there’s Abe Lincoln who felt similarly. And let’s not forget the signer of the Civil Rights and Voting Rights Act, President Lyndon B. Johnson. The infamous Richard Nixon wrote the executive order for affirmative action, but we all know what he was.

I’m not making this stuff up. Read your history, you’ll be surprised by what they don’t teach you in public schools. Hell, for that matter, teachers and police are probably two of the most prejudicial American occupations, for obvious reasons. That includes Black ones too!

I was reading a web article at about 3 a.m. the other day that brought me to full awareness. It was entitled “30 celebs that got caught being publicly racist.”

Among the celebrities was “porn star” and heir to the Hilton hotel chain Paris Hilton who said she would never date, much less get intimate with a Black man because we’re gross.

By the way, if you ever watched Hilton in her infamous porn video, you could eliminate one prejudice many of us have about White women. (I mean that’s what I, err, heard from people who saw the video).

Pop star Justin Bieber repeats the adjective/noun “nigger” in one of his songs, and was caught making jokes about Black people where he repeatedly refers to us as “niggas” (I hate that word, think everybody who uses it is standing under the shadow of slavery, but I’ll use it here for shock value).

During an intoxicated rage, Charlie Sheen called his ex-wife Denise Richards a “f...nigger.” (I won’t spell out what the “f” stands for, that’s too much shock for a PG paper).

Mel Gibson, who got into hot water for anti-Semitic utterings, told his ex-girlfriend he hoped she got raped by a group of “niggers.”

John Mayer said in an article that he had a David Duke penis, whatever that means.

Former radio show jock Don Imus lost his nationally syndicated show and millions of dollars when he referred to the sisters who make up the Rutgers women’s basketball team as a bunch of “nappy headed hos.”

And there was no doubt who wanna be White rapper Kreyshawn was appealing to when she declared she wished they would bring back slavery, and “I don’t need Black fans anyway. Y’all don’t buy albums anyway.” When she was taken to task, she tried to confuse the matter by

I Call Him Friend!

I believe it was in the fall of 1979 in fourth grade at Richards School that Craig Counsell and I became friends.

While in elementary and middle school we always played on sports teams together.

Whether it was basketball, baseball, football, or track, we always competed for our teams and against one another.

But we were very good friends. In the summer time I would ride my bike or take the bus to Whitefish Bay.

Craig and I would play strike out at the school right across the street from where he lived because it was easy for his mom to keep an eye on us. Also, we were easily able to grab a snack whenever we wanted one.

I remember one story very vividly as a kid that involved Craig and I playing basketball. It was a Saturday morning and we were playing against Cumberland school.

We were beating them very badly and Craig and I were the two leading scorers. I had 19 points and Craig had 20 points. It was the last seconds of the game and Craig stole the ball and he and I were the only two down the court to make the shot.

He could have easily dribbled down and taken the layup. But instead, like the true team player he was, he passed it to me. I think we won the game 59 to 8 and I had 21 points while Craig had 20.

That is the kind of friend he was and always has been to me.

When we began high, school Craig focused on baseball and I continued to play all four sports. I always tried to get him to play other sports but he was his typical self, very focused on what he wanted to get accomplished.

He and I played high school baseball together and we were like a dynamic duo, we were so good because we pushed one another. In the summer time I would go and play in the Milwaukee Beckum-Stapleton League because I didn’t live in Whitefish Bay and couldn’t play in their league.

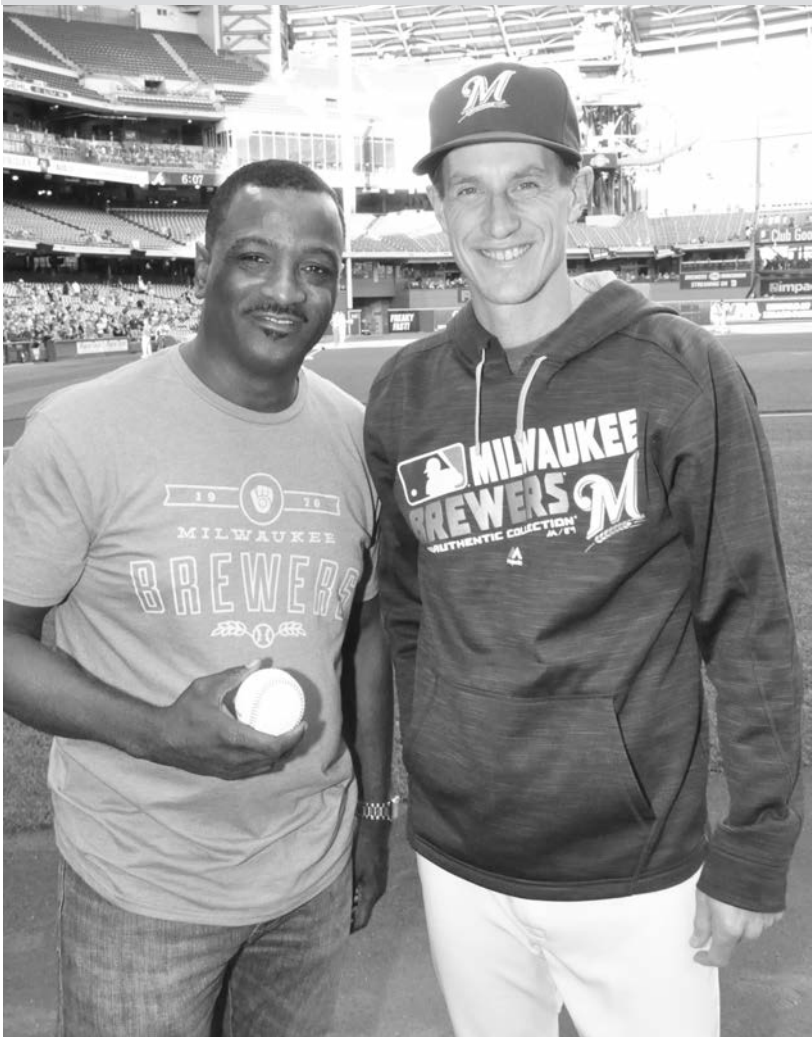
We often would play against Whitefish Bay in the All Star games and I would end up playing against my long-time friend instead of playing with him.

One game in particular, in the summer after our freshman year, we had to play Whitefish Bay in an All-Star game and Craig was pitching. One of my teammates who had great hitting power came up to bat against Craig.

I wanted to warn Craig to be careful, but I couldn’t because now I was on the other team. The next thing I knew, there goes a long home run over the fence.

In our time together, since we have become adults and have families of our own, Craig and I have talked about those days when I played in the Beckum-Stapleton league and how good those times were.

He has also shared concern because of what he has seen in recent years as the quality of players and coaches have taken a decline from what he remembers during the past years of what that league represented.

I hope to have an opportunity to work with Craig, the Milwaukee Brewers, and the Beckum-Stapleton League; to restore an organization that produced great young men, that had a thirst for winning, and a pride that allowed them to walk with their heads high as young leaders within their communities.

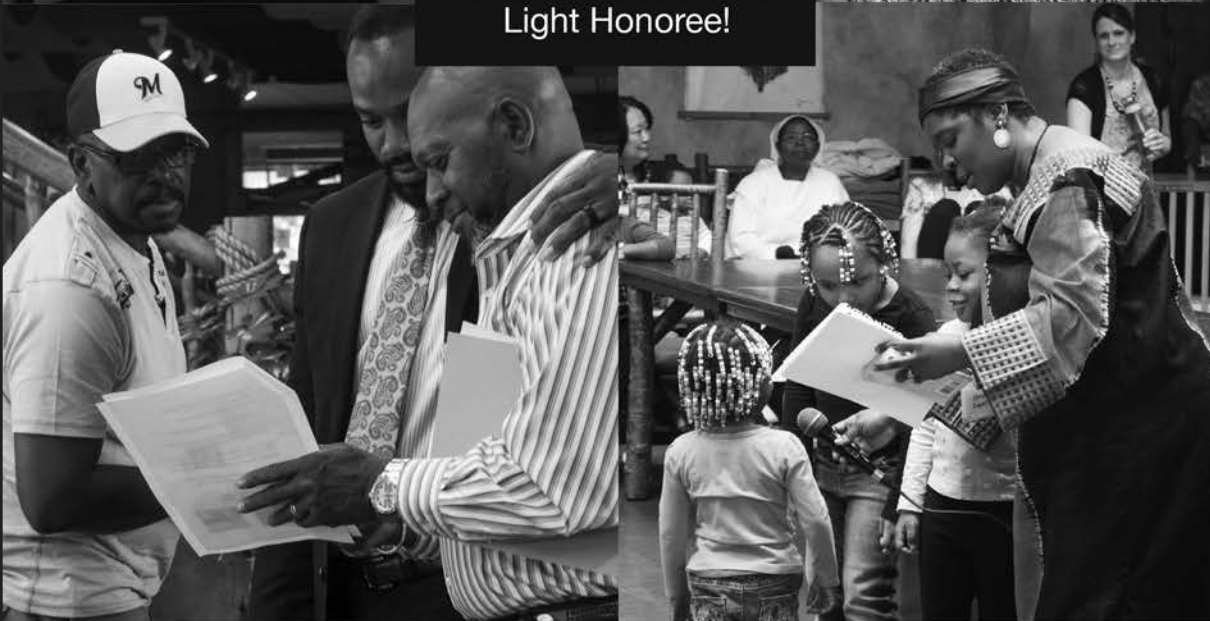

1). Today, many Black people use a white image to depict Jesus. Africans who practiced Christianity before slavery used Black images historically to describe their god.

2). Enslaved Africans were taught to fear and devalue African religious practices. Today, most Black people

in the world still don't seek to inculcate traditional African religions.

3). Many Black people across the world still use the King James version of the Bible as the final authority of Christianity.

4). Today, many Black people focus only on religious dogma that was taught during slavery and colo-

nialism rather than developing a spiritual relationship with the creator.

5). The majority of enslaved Africans were taught to no longer honor and connect spiritually with their ancestors. As a result, many Black people today devalue the idea of developing a connection with their ancestors.

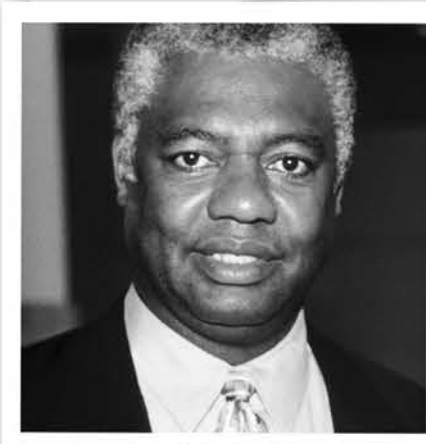
