Judge rules temporary orange fencing put up around Sherman Park will stay down

There were some heated moments in court Wednesday, September 7th before a judge decided the temporary orange fencing put up around Sherman Park in the wake of unrest in August will stay down.

The judge on Wednesday ruled to continue a restraining order against Milwaukee County Sheriff David Clarke -- ordering that the fence stay down.

The judge pointed out the issue before the court wasn't so much about a fence -- calling it more of a "power struggle" involving Sheriff Clarke and Milwaukee County Executive Chris Abele.

Clarke had the fence put up around the park after the unrest in the wake of the fatal shooting of Sylville Smith by a Milwaukee police officer on August 13th.

The park had been closing at 6:00 p.m. instead of 10:00 p.m. in the wake of the unrest in the area. To help keep the park closed, the orange fence was put into place.

On Sunday, September 4th, Abele ordered it taken down. Abele said for two weeks, he sent requests to the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Office to discuss removing the fence, but didn't get a response.

"We sent him a legal opinion from corporation counsel, which are the same lawyers who service the Sheriff's Department. Both had a written opinion saying, 'Sheriff, you don't have the authority on the curfew or the fence' and that didn't get it done either," Abele said.

By afternoon, Clarke had ordered it put back up.

That led to a rare Sunday evening court hearing, where the judge ordered it taken down.

After a lot of tension, the judge on Wednesday ruled the fence will stay down.

This isn't over yet, however. Another hearing has been scheduled for September 29th at 2:30 p.m.

Clarke's attorney has requested a substitution. He wants a different judge to proceed over this case.

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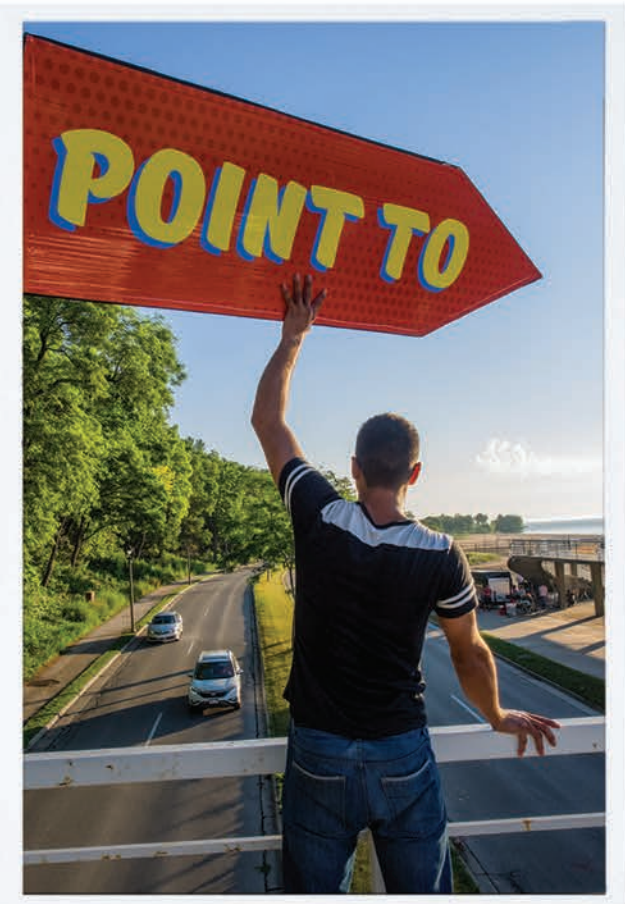

The Need for Speed!

The Messmer Catholic School family buried one of its youth members Friday, the victim of a bad decision by a 17-year-old who decided to speed home after a basketball game.

Actually, two members of the Milwaukee family died in that car accident.

They were among a dozen Black children who have died under similar circumstances this summer.

Half of them were joy riding in stolen cars, a seemingly new fad that has stunned Milwaukee both in its frequency and fatal consequences.

Those “car-lamities” represent an overlapping phenomena that undergirds a culture those in my generation can’t understand, or adapt to: a preoccupation with speed, and other reckless nonsensical behavior by a generation with advantages in technology and information we could only visualize while watching Star Trek (the original series with William Shatner, the guy who appears on the Huppy and Abraham commercials, although he was not as fat or old as he is today).

Speed, it seems, is a symptom as well as a cultural nuance. It is a centerpiece in a jigsaw puzzle, a key to a door of events that frequently ends in tragedy.

Speed seems to be a preoccupation of our youth today, and we’re still trying to figure out why.

It seems a week doesn’t go by without news of a young Black driver—with, or without a license—engaged in an accident as a result of speeding. More often than not, it’s the innocent passenger who ends up in the morgue.

The driver of the vehicle that killed Demetrius Batchelor Jr. and Latrey L. Hale two weeks ago was reportedly driving 80 miles an hour! Speed truly kills.

By the way, the driver, Donte Barnes, was charged with negligent homicide and could end up spending much of his adult life in prison because of a lapse in judgment. That’s another tragedy.

From everything I’ve heard, Donte is a good kid, a good student and believes in God (a carry over from our generation).

Two of the kids in the car with him were relatives, so I assume he didn’t mean to cause injury, much less death.

And now—regardless of what happens to him in court—he will have to live the rest of his life with the memory of how a split second decision changed the lives of four families.

What possessed Barnes to risk not only his life, but also his friends? Obviously, he didn’t have anywhere to get to in such a hurry. Was it the thrill of danger? Peer pressure? A youthful—and illogical—belief in immortality?

Or was it something inherent within a subculture we older intrinsics simply can’t relate to?

This is a generation brought up on ever-faster computers, speed dialing and “fast” food. They are growing up

quicker than my generation—12-year-old girls look, and act, like they are 20, and boys are getting them pregnant before they learn how to walk in high heels, get their first “tramp stamp” or their first weave.

Ask the average person over 50 their general feelings about today’s Black youth and they’ll probably roll their eyes and shake their heads before making a few generalizations about their choice of music, their disrespect and the “the world owes me something” mentality.

Unless you interrupt them by shoving a piece of bar-b-que in their mouths, they will go on to say today’s youth are not taking advan-

thought us strange.

Nonetheless, my generation that spoke of pride in our African heritage called our hairstyles Afros and established a link to the diaspora through African dress and the evolution of Kwanzaa.

And don’t get hung up on last month’s civil disturbance that the White media called a riot three weeks ago. I remember a hot day in July 1967 when my generation threw a few bottles and firebombs.

Yeah, today’s new generation is different, but that’s not necessarily bad. Except for the speeding.

And that’s a phenomenon that transcends the criminally inclined as well

tage of the civil rights battles we won, and they are overly reckless when driving, including speeding.

But are those attributes of a subculture, something in the food and water (lead)?

Before you use an “absolute” to generalize about today’s Black youth, note that most are on the right path, they possess the mores and values God entrusted us to instill in them.

In fact, just because they might listen to Snoop Doggy Dud, or wear their pants below their waistlines, don’t assume they won’t eventually come around.

As Teju Ologboni is fond of saying, while we criticize today’s youth for wearing their pants down around their thighs, we wore “Sansabelts,” pulled up around our throats (partly to expose our stuff, if you get my drift).

Our generation’s music introduced sexual promiscuity and spoken word artists like the Last Poets and Gil Scott Heron who rhymed of “The Revolution Will Not Be Televised,” much to the chagrin of older civil rights activists who preached nonviolence, passive resistance and integration as the cure-all for American apartheid.

We, however, spoke of Black Pride and Africentric lifestyles. We morphed from being Negroes to African Americans, even as the elders

Including my honor student grandson who I’ve discovered has a lead foot.

The next time we hit the road, I’ll tell him about the burial of two boys his age. And how and why they died so early in life’s journey. Hopefully that message will penetrate to his core and he’ll realize that for those teenagers, the only place speeding got them to quicker was an early grave.

Hillary Clinton:

Times have been tough, there is no doubt about it.

Even as the United States works its way out of the Great Recession, young adults have found it increasingly difficult to find employment. About one in ten Americans between the ages of 16 and 24 are unemployed, more than twice the national average.

But when we look even closer, the numbers are worse for our community: the unemployment rate for African American young adults is almost twice that of white teenagers.

This is unacceptable, and Hillary Clinton has pledged to do everything she can to level the playing field.

Hillary has worked her entire life to break down the barriers that hold people back from reaching their God-given potential. She understands the need to focus on removing obstacles that keep wages down and make it harder for our young people to find good-paying jobs.

Hillary wholeheartedly believes that a black child should have the same chance at economic prosperity as a white child.

To make this vision a reality, she has detailed a \$125 billion Economic Revitalization Initiative which will help provide underserved communities advance towards economic prosperity.

These funds would support millions of jobs and internships for young African-Americans across America.

Additionally, she believes that those who have made mistakes in their lives should not be permanently knocked down.

More than 600,000 people annually return to their communities from prison, and millions more come home following time in jail for low-level offenses.

Too many of these people lack the necessary tools to succeed. In particular, they are often closed out of jobs for which they are qualified. Not only is this an economic issue and a fairness issue, it is a family issue too.

That being said, Hillary has proposed a \$5 billion investment in reentry programs for formerly incarcerated people to help get them back on their feet and enter the workforce.

She understands that everyone deserves a second chance, and it is in our moral and economic interest to insure that is realized.

Hillary, like many of us, knows that the barriers of bigotry hold back our communities from reaching their god-given potential. This is particularly true for communities of color.

The systematic racism our communities face on a daily basis hinder not only our societal progress, but our economic progress. Hillary has fought her entire life to break such barriers down, and she will continue to do so until the job is done.

The book is available at Living By the Word bookstore. It is also available in the Amazon Kindle ebook store.

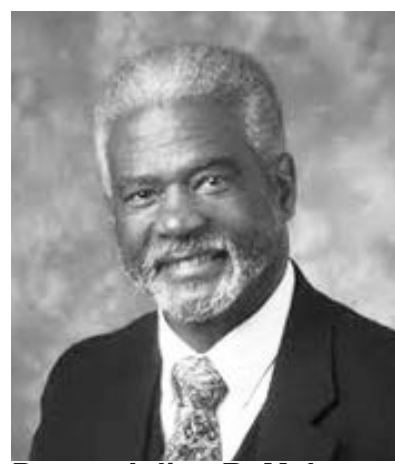
Malone, Senior Pastor at The New Testament Church of Milwaukee, was given a two-percent chance of surviving pancreatic cancer on December 31, 2013.

"For their good and His glory, God took Joseph through the pit and through the prison before promoting him to the palace," said Malone. "God took the children of Israel through the Red Sea.

"God took David through the valley of the shadow of death. God took Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego through the fiery furnace. God took Daniel through the lion's den."

In this book, he credits God, work-

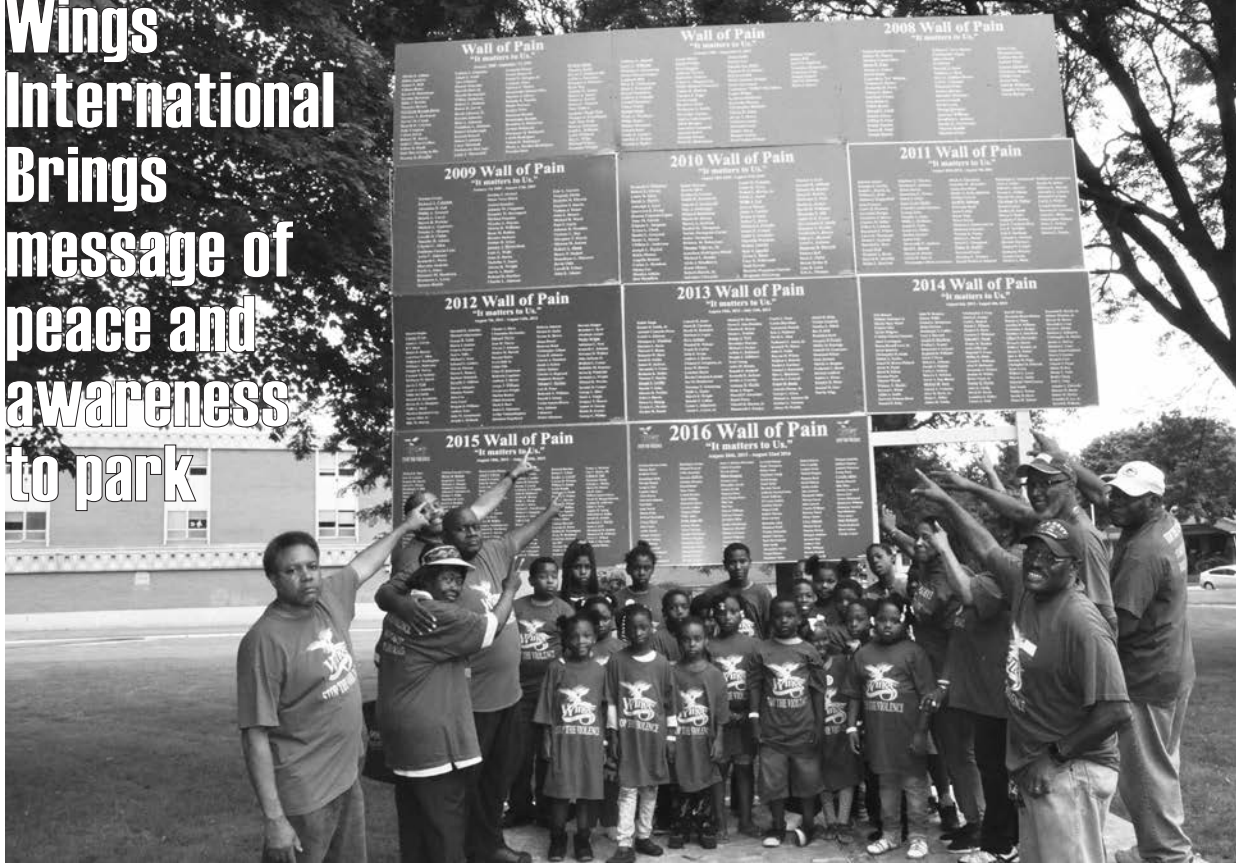

Survey: A third of employers reject job candidates because of social media posts

A third of companies have rejected applicants for jobs after checking their social media accounts.

More than half of HR professionals said the way candidates Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and LinkedIn accounts look affect there employment prospects.

At least a third went further and said they had not passed prospective employees on to the interview stage of the hiring process because of posts

they had made.

But it seems the trend works both ways with 28 percent of applicants also saying what they read about a company online influences their decision to apply, a survey has revealed.

And jobseekers are also getting wise to firms trawling the web for information about them with half of men and women say they are conscious of how their accounts may look to employers.

Parents: Focus on protective factors to delay teen sexual activity

HOUSTON – It is not uncommon for parents to worry about what their teenage children are doing on a Friday or Saturday night but according to a Baylor College of Medicine expert, it is weekday afternoons when teens often choose to engage in risky behaviors like sexual activities.

"The hours between 4 and 6 p.m. can be difficult because during this time teens are home from school but in many cases, parents have not yet gotten home from work.

Teens are unsupervised, and it can be a time when they start doing things like having sex," said Dr. Peggy Smith, director of the Baylor Teen Health Clinics.

That's a scary thought for parents, since there's not much they can do to rearrange their work schedule. Fortunately, there are other protective factors that parents should focus on that may delay a teen becoming sex-

gave me a foundation upon which to grow.

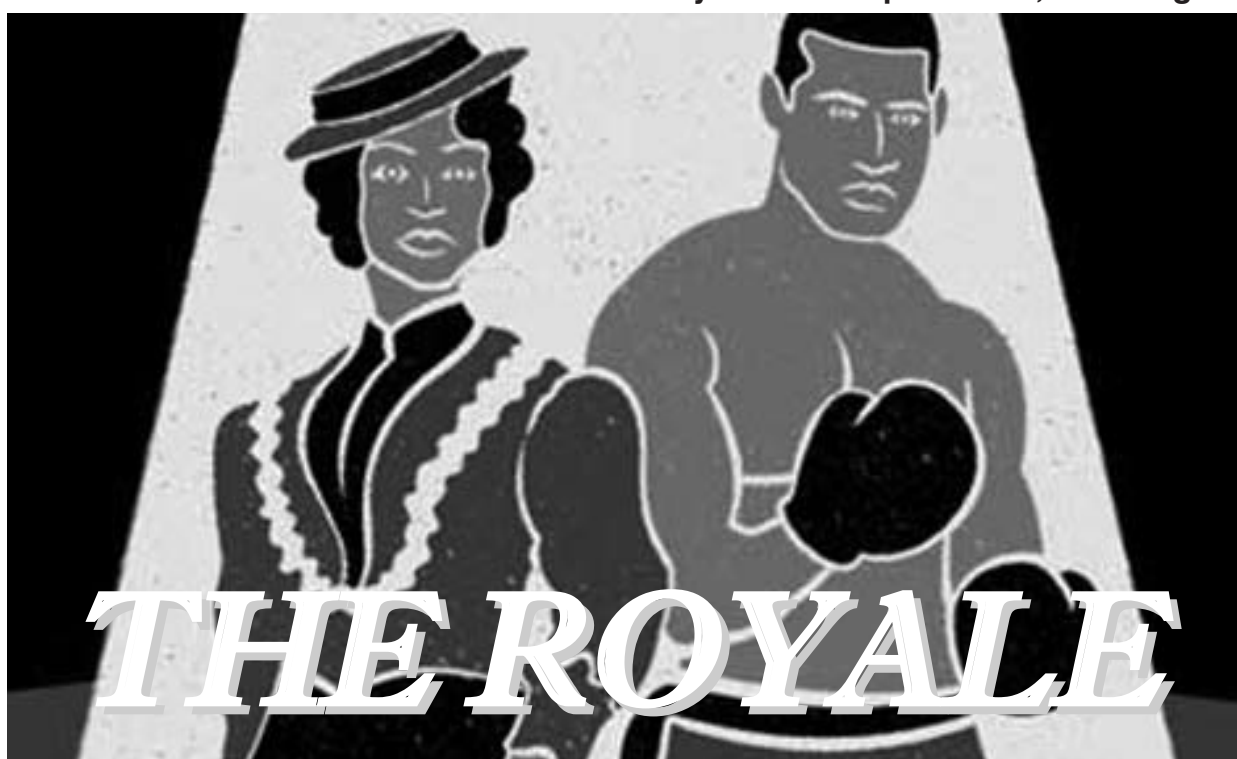
I really want to give back to this community that has given me so much."

ually active. These include:

- Eating meals together to encourage a supportive family unit
- Encouraging academic excellence and extracurricular activities to positively fill their free time
- Having two parents involved in the child’s life, either as an intact family or through a “team” parenting approach
- Having a religious affiliation
- Talking with your kids about sexual development and decisions surrounding sexual activity

While talking with your child is important throughout their teen years, it’s also key to communicate in a way that is appropriate for their age. Smith offers some advice on effective communication:

For younger teens – ages 13 to 15 – keep the conversation honest and direct. They want to know why their bodies are changing, so parents can use that discussion as a way to talk about sex. Teens at this age have an increased desire for privacy and they often believe bad things can’t happen to them, so it can be a time for risk-taking. Parents should be aware of changes in behavior and keep in mind that they should be able to monitor any technology that they pay for.

By middle adolescence – ages 15 to 17 – teens are starting to challenge parents on issues like clothes, hair color and dating.

Parents should choose their battles wisely with this age group and continue to be direct, but non-hostile, when talking about sex. Teens may start to have sex during this stage of development but they also are capable of abstract and logical thinking, like the importance of planning ahead.

Still, they may not be mature enough to appreciate the long-term consequences of sexual behavior. Parents should keep this in mind and talk about the potential outcomes, emotionally and physically, of being sexually active.

In late adolescence, teens have a desire to relate to their parents, and they are interested in discussion on topics related to ethics and moral values.

They can understand the risks and consequences of sex, and they may want to know what their parents think about sex. Don’t turn away from these conversations, Smith advises. Parents may also want to use conversations with older teens as a form of practice with their younger teens.

Whatever the age of the teen, parents should not shy away from conversations about sex and other potentially risky behavior.

“Family is sometimes not a powerful behavior-shaping force because of parental discomfort with sexual discussion,” Smith said. “When this is the case, teens typically turn to their peers for information. Parents need to think about who they want their children getting information from.”

and not allowed to box in the US for many years. Ali lost millions but it seemed that his soul remained intact.

He showed us by his personal act, that our worth is not determined by green backs and coins but by the tenets of our hearts and those valuable truths that we would willingly sacrifice our lives for.

It was Ali who told the world that he would not put on a military uniform and journey thousands of miles away to drop bombs and bullets on brown people in Vietnam while Black people were being treated like dogs right here in the streets of America.

Ali unapologetically said that the real enemy was not Vietnam but the good ole’ USA. It was Ali who said he would willingly go to war if he thought it would bring freedom and equality to Black people.

For Ali, the real test was whether he would stand up for his beliefs while facing the possibility of jail. In the end, Ali reflected that he really had nothing to lose if he went to jail because we (Black people) had been in jail for 400 years.

Like Ali, Kaepernick did not mince his words when explaining why he refused to stand during the playing of the national anthem. Kaepernick said he could not stand up and show pride for a country or a flag that “oppresses Black people and people of color.”

He said the oppression that he witnessed was “bigger than football.” He spoke of the bodies lying in the streets. Kaepernick knew he might pay a heavy price for his beliefs but he set down anyway. ‘If they take football away, my endorsements from me, I know that I stood up for what is right,’ Kaepernick said. Sound familiar?

Kaepernick, a Black NFL quarterback who was once chastised by a reporter for wearing his cap backwards.

‘Turn your cap around and act like a professional quarterback,’ the reporter wrote. I guess that reporter was blissfully unaware that White NFL quarterbacks also wore their caps backwards.

Or what about the reporter who loathed the tattoos on his arms, comparing Kaepernick’s look to that of a prisoner who just got paroled. It didn’t seem to matter to that reporter, that under Kaepernick’s leadership, the 49er’s earned a trip to Super Bowl XLVII. But I digress...

Is it possible that Kaepernick was asking how could the United States of America, home of the brave and land of the free, the great variegated country who promised that all men were created equal impinge upon the unalienable rights of its citizens of color... the right to Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness?

Poll: Young Black adults less trusting of police

Young Americans are about equally likely to say they’ve had an encounter with police, but young black adults are much more likely than whites to say they’ve been arrested, harassed or know someone who has been, a new GenForward poll says.

Twenty-eight percent of blacks say they have been arrested after encounters with law enforcement, 24 percent say they’ve been personally harassed by police, and 53 percent say they know someone who has, according to the poll released Wednesday.

The numbers are much lower for whites and Asian-Americans, while Hispanics fall in between.

Breaking it down, 22 percent of Hispanics, 15 percent of whites and 10 percent of Asians-Americans say they have been arrested after encounters with police.

Sixteen percent of Hispanics, 8 percent of whites and 4 percent of Asian-Americans say they’ve experienced harassment, while about a third of Hispanics and about a quarter of Asian-Americans and whites say someone they know has been harassed by police.

The results may explain some resentment toward police among young African-American adults. On Sunday, San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick cited police mistreatment of minorities as a reason for his refusal to stand during the playing of “The Star-Spangled Banner” at National Football League preseason games.

Senate incumbent Taylor defeats challenger Barnes in hotly contested primary race

Jason fields to return to Assembly, Gwen Moore easily defeats challenger Gary George

Incumbent state Sen. Lena Taylor handily won the most hotly anticipated, contested and discussed political race of the year, defeating her challenger, Rep. Mandela Barnes in the August 9 state primary elections.

Taylor collected 61 percent (11,420) of the votes in her fourth district senatorial race. Despite heavy financial backing and support from the predominately white suburb of Shorewood—and the political action group, Wisconsin Working Family Party, Barnes could only muster 39 percent (7,414) of the votes.

In what could best be described as the second most hotly contested political race in the community, incumbent Milwaukee County District Attorney John Chisholm defeated Atty. Verona Swanigan. Chisholm received \$1,469 votes (65 percent) to Swanigan's 27,570 votes (35 percent).

Described by local WNOV radio talk show host Sherwin Hughes as "a phoenix rising from the ashes," former State Rep. Jason Fields reclaimed his former District 11 Assembly seat, narrowly defeating Darrol Gibson.

Fields collected 2,930 votes (59 percent) to Gibson's 2,062 (41 percent).

If there were ever a proverbial "cake walk," it would be the contest between incumbent U.S. Congresswoman Gwen Moore and former state Senator Gary George.

Figuratively speaking (and expectedly), Moore walked all over George in this primary election, receiving 85 percent of the votes (55,093) to George's poultry 15 percent (6,508 votes).

In the other senate race involving our community, Rep. LaTonya Johnson will succeed Nikiya Harris Dodd in senate district six, who stepped down from the position for personal reasons.

Johnson defeated two other challengers for the seat, Thomas Harris and Michael Bonds, the former president of the Milwaukee Public School's Board of Directors.

Johnson collected 9,560 votes (61 percent). The race for second place between Harris and Bonds was tight, with Harris receiving 3,158 votes (20 percent), and Bonds 3,011 (19 percent).

In two other Assembly races in predominately Black districts, incumbent state Rep. Leon Young retained his District 16 seat defeating Edgar Lin, Brandy Bond, and Stephen Jansen.

David Crowley will now represent the 17th Assembly district, defeating two other candidates, Kim Burns—the daughter of the late legendary lawmaker Polly Williams—and Marcus Hart.

Call goes out for economic boycott of Christmas!

In 1963 responding to the bombing of the 16th Street Church in Birmingham, Ala that took the lives of four Black girls, Dr. Martin Luther King called for a "redistribute the pain" campaign in response to the pain felt by Black America by withholding Black dollars with an economic boycott.

In the last two years of his life, Dr. King again implored Black people to retaliate against racism and racist institutions by using the "power of economic withdrawal" by boycotting Christmas.

At a Milwaukee City Hall news conference Tuesday, November 11, the local organizing committee for #JusticeOrElse resurrected Dr. King's call by unveiling a campaign of economic withdrawal—a boycott—starting November 27—"Black Friday"—until after New Years Day.

The Christmas boycott is a response to police brutality and killings, racist attacks and economic injustice in Milwaukee and around the nation.

The coalition is reportedly urging Black residents to not spend money over the holidays unless it will go directly into the Black community.

"The Black are in pain, the Brown are in pain, the workers are in pain, so let's redistribute the pain and not spend one dime to help the rich make their bottom line (during the Christmas season)"

Group's petition calls on Governor to oust Milwaukee County D.A. Chisholm

Charging that Milwaukee County District Attorney John Chisholm is guilty of malfeasance, neglect of duty and official misconduct, a group of county taxpayers on Thursday filed a petition asking Gov. Scott Walker to begin the process of removing the DA from office.

Interestingly, the citizens are urging the Republican governor to employ a rarely used statute to dispose of the same Democratic district attorney who launched at least two secret and politically driven John Doe investigations into Walker.

"Our law in Wisconsin allows you to remove John Chisholm for cause. Cause includes malfeasance in office, neglect of duty or official misconduct. We have provided a dozen charges for your review," states the petition signed by some of Chisholm's harshest critics, including Craig Stingley, father of Corey Stingley, the 16-year-old who died after being restrained by customers in a West Allis convenience store.

He had attempted to steal alcoholic beverages from the retailer. His death was ruled a homicide by the Milwaukee County medical examiner's office.

Chisholm could not be reached for comment Thursday. His assistant said he was in a meeting. Chisholm has not returned dozens of calls from Watchdog seeking comment on myriads issues.

Milwaukee community organizer Tony Lowe, also one of the petition signers, on Thursday afternoon presented the governor's office with two thick binders of charges. Simultaneously, city activists rallied at the Martin Luther statue near downtown Milwaukee. They called for Chisholm's removal.

Walker was not in his office at the time the petition was delivered. His spokeswoman said he would not immediately return an email seeking comment.

A small crowd of about 30 protesters, mostly black residents, turned out on a blustery, overcast day to make their case against Milwaukee County's top prosecutor.

On the front of the speaker's podium, set up next to the statue of King, was an illustration of Chisholm behind bars. The same image could be found on bright orange t-shirts worn by eight members of the crowd.

Sherwin Hughes, one of the organizers, is a progressive talk radio personality in Milwaukee, host of The Forum on WNOV 860 AM. Hughes was among several speakers at the event calling for Chisholm's removal.
