Study Finds Black College Students Face Mental Health Crisis

Proving their intellectual worth in the face of racism takes a mental and physical toll

Black students who succeed at elite universities may do so at the risk of their mental well-being, according to a recent study.

The study, from researchers at Vanderbilt University's Peabody College of Education and Human Development, claims researchers are ignoring a mental health crisis for black college students who have had to draw on mental toughness and perseverance to achieve in predominantly white academic institutions.

Being resilient is required for any college student, said Ebony McGee and David Stovall, the study's authors, but black students bear the extra burden of proving their intellectual worth in the face of overt or covert racism. And that takes a mental and physical toll.

"Weathering the cumulative effects of living in a society characterized by white dominance and privilege produces a kind of physical and mental wear and tear that contributes to a host of psychological and physical ailments," said McGee, assistant professor of diversity and urban schooling at Vanderbilt.

"We have documented alarming occurrences of anxiety, stress, depression and thoughts of suicide, as well as a host of physical ailments like hair loss, diabetes and heart disease."

Grit, a buzzword that describes the type of determination students must embrace if they want to succeed, has become associated with the success of students from disadvantaged communities and communities of color, where schools are often understaffed and under-resourced, and where students may not have strong support systems at home.

There's currently much debate about whether students should be taught grit versus forcing colleges to recognize the additional challenges African-American students face in earning a degree.

"Those who are struggling with the multiple burdens associated with being a black student must be protected against daily discrimination," said Stovall, an associate professor of African-American studies and education policy at University of Illinois at Chicago.

In contrast to research that concludes with messages of the need for grit

and a tougher mental attitude, a more holistic perspective focuses on gaining a thorough understanding of the psychological, emotional and mental harm these students endure."

The researchers named this phenomenon "John Henryism," after historical figure John Henry, a slave who worked himself to death in order to prove his worth.

"John Henryism is a coping strategy often adopted by high-achieving African Americans, who may unconsciously sacrifice their personal relationships and health to pursue their goals with a tenacity that can be medically and mentally deleterious," the study's authors said.

"The process of healing from racial battle fatigue and institutional racism requires significant internal commitment and external support. Black college students are brilliant, talented and creative, and they dream as big as other students. Pursuing higher education should not make them sick."

Infants most at risk of dying from influenza

Influenza causes serious illness among millions of people each year, resulting in 250,000 to 500,000 deaths.

Those most at risk include infants younger than six months, because they cannot be vaccinated against the disease.

Now, in a new study with mice, researchers have identified a naturally occurring protein that, when added to the flu vaccine, may offer protection to babies during their first months of life.

#"Influenza vaccine works by stimulating a person's immune system to make antibodies that attack the flu virus," said Michael Sherman, professor emeritus of child health at the University of Missouri. "However, infants younger than six months do not make antibodies when given flu vaccine. This is because the immune systems of these very young babies do not respond to the adjuvant, or additive, within the vaccine that boosts the body's immune response when confronted with a virus.'

The adjuvant used in most vaccines is aluminum hydroxide, or ALUM. ALUM is an additive that essentially acts as an irritant to attract white blood cells called neutrophils to the vaccination site. Neutrophils secrete the protein lactoferrin, which works with the immune system to impede the virus's ability to survive in the

However, in premature and term infants, ALUM doesn't make immature immune cells work better. In this very young group, only the smaller amount of naturally occurring lactoferrin found near the vaccination site improves the immune response.

"It is well documented that infants obtain protection against certain infections from nutrients found in breast milk," Sherman said. "Lactoferrin is the major protein in a mother's milk and boosts her infant's immune system to fight infection. In theory, we felt that we could create a vaccine by replacing ALUM with lactoferrin as an additive."

To test their hypothesis, researchers studied mice vaccinated with either the adjuvant

ALUM or lactoferrin. The mice, whose ages approximated those of human infants younger and

older than six months, received


As reported in the journal Biochemical and Biophysical Re-Communications, lactoferrin worked slightly better than ALUM as an adjuvant and also provided four to five times the protection against influenza, compared to the control group that received an influenza vaccine without an adjuvant.

"Currently, the best protection for neonatal babies is to vaccinate the mother and all those who will have close contact with the infant," Sherman said. "Our recent study was meant to test the possibility of creating a safe and effective flu vaccine for very high-risk premature infants. Now that we have, we feel that the use of a natural protein would make immunization not only possible but more accepted."

The researchers will next study lactoferrin's ability to prevent secondary infections such as pneumonia, as well as the possibility the protein could be used as an adjuvant in other vaccines.

What are the five most important things people should know about the flu?

We spoke to William Kellibrew, an international advocate for civil, human, children and victims' rights, about this virus and why you should get your flu shot. This is what he told us:

1. We are all susceptible to contracting the flu virus. Everyone knows someone who has had the flu. So it is important to prevent ourselves from catching the

And also to prevent spreading the flu. It is a potentially serious, debilitating disease that can completely impact every aspect of our lives. Prevention is the

Our lack of awareness about the impact it can have not just on our own lives, but on our family members and our community. We have to think about the broader picture here. It's not just about me, it's about us. It's about we.

2. The flu vaccine, according to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention), is really the best modern way to focus on protection. There's so many myths about the vaccine.

'If you get the vaccine, you get the flu.' In the minority community, there's such a distrust for government. Imagine going somewhere and they're shooting you up with a needle and you don't know what they're giving you.

It's become a real issue. But doctors have said this time and again: If you do not get the shot, you are more at risk and vulnerable to the flu than if you get the shot. Millions of doses of flu vaccine have been administered to people safely for decades.

3. There are people who are more at risk for developing flu-related complications—young children (the CDC recommends every child above the age of 6 months receive the flu shot) up to 8 or 9 years old are vulnerable.

Young children need to develop a higher immunity to the flu and complications. Their bodies need to develop more of the resistance. I've been speaking with parents whose child, at 7 years old, got the flu and

He went into a coma. Pregnant women, people with certain chronic health conditions like asthma, diabetes, heart and lung disease. People over the age

Having the flu really does impact your productivity. It can completely incapacitate you. It could lead to pneumonia, hospitalization or death. Or the worsening of existing health conditions.

I'm a type 2 diabetic, and it could really harm me badly. My body's already addressing health conditions, so when the flu happens, it's, like, I've gotta focus on something else now, and it all kind of falls

4. We can combat this with education about the importance of the flu shot. Tell real-life stories—like the story of this 7-year-old who was almost wiped out. Not that we wanna use scare tactics, but there are real-life consequences to not addressing it. There has to be some cultural sensitivity to addressing the

One of the challenges we have is that the CDC, hospitals and health-care systems don't really track flu, so it's hard to track deaths and sickness due to the flu. So the number of individuals who have lost their lives due to the flu have usually had that flu and then other complications arose.

It totally and completely weakens the immune system. Annually, 3,000 to 49,000 people die. It kills way more people than Ebola and impacts so many more. We have to bring awareness. And the awareness needs cultural humility.

We have to respect enough to address the issues in certain communities without making assumptions or judgments about that community. We have to do it utilizing the voices in those communities that are champions for health.

5. It's not too late. You can still get your flu shot. It takes two weeks to build up immunity; that's why it's important to get it now. I am terrified of needles. So for me to get the flu shot, I've actually passed out. I'm so afraid. But i got it anyway. I realized the importance of it.



More Men Getting Screening Colonoscopies

Thanks, Obamacare!

Men are getting more screening colonoscopies since the health law reduced how much Medicare beneficiaries pay out of pocket for the preventive tests, a recent study found.

The change, however, didn't affect women's rates.

The study, published in the December issue of Health Affairs, compared rates of screening for colorectal cancer among people age 66 to 75 before and after the health law passed in 2010. Starting in 2011, that law waived the Medicare Part B deductible (which totals \$147 annually in 2015) and eliminated the requirement that beneficiaries pay 20 percent of the cost for screening colonoscopies.

The data came from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) annual Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System.

The study found that in men, colonoscopy screening rates increased from 18 to 22 percent following implementation of the health law, a 20 percent increase. In women, however, the rate didn't budge, remaining at 18 percent even after the law passed.

The study's finding that women didn't respond to policy changes related to colorectal cancer screening coverage is consistent with other research, said Kandice Kapinos, the study co-author who is an economist at Rand, a non-profit research and policy organization.

"Maybe they assess their risk differently because they generally have a lower incidence of colorectal cancer than men," she

There is also some research that shows that women are more likely to say an endoscopic screening test such as a colonoscopy is embarrassing and to opt instead for a blood stool screening test, Kapinos said.

Under the health law, services that are recommended by the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force are covered without patients having to pay anything out of pocket.

The task force recommends screening for colorectal cancer using stool testing, sigmoidoscopy or colonoscopy between age 50 and 75.

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of death in cancers that affect both men and women, according to the CDC. The colonoscopy is considered highly effective as a screening tool because it can locate polyps, most of which are benign, and remove them before they have a chance to become malignant.

Screening rates are lower than they should be, however, and only 40 percent of adults are up to date, according to the study.

Under the health law, private plans can't charge consumers a portion of the cost if, during their screening colonoscopy, a polyp is discovered and removed. That step is considered an integral part of a colonoscopy.

Under Medicare, however, beneficiaries may be charged 20

percent coinsurance in such instances because if a polyp is found, the procedure is then considered diagnostic rather than screening.

The researchers note that disparity and suggest the elimination of "the remaining difference in cost-sharing between screening and therapeutic colonoscopies could improve screening rates."

The American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network continues to urge Congress to close the loophole, says spokeswoman Alissa Crispino.






